time when there is central filing of something it's because you need the information, either to clear a land title or to clear the title on personal property. Liens are filed with the Secretary of State's Office, other documents are filed with the Registrar of Deeds Office. But I don't know that it's ever been our practice to simply centrally file information that's not of use directly related to financing instruments and facilitating business transactions of that nature. I suppose we could take the leap to filing other things that are much less often used, but I'm a little bit like Senator Landis, I don't know where you start to draw the line. But just in case you are interested in it from the title association point of view, not the Title Association's point of view, but from the point of view from one who's involved in the title business, I don't see any value in doing this. And it seems like another expense, I guess, we have to make the judgment of whether it's going to be used that often or it's that hard to get documents from the county itself, but it certainly is of little or no value with regard to the perfecting of financing instruments of any type. **SENATOR CUDABACK:** Mr. Speaker, members, I won't prolong this. But I guess there's...to answer Senator Landis' question, there isn't anything special about this particular subject. I guess if other agencies or so on wanted to have a centralized place to file, I guess they could bring a bill and do this. This is nothing special given particularly to this. We thought at the time that it would be nice, perhaps nice to have a place to go to if you had a question on any one county. Rather than calling five counties, if you had a particular question on any one of the five, just call the Secretary of State's Office and he can answer all of those questions, and you can compare and so on and so forth. So, if that's wrong, it's wrong; if it's right, it's right, I guess. It's just that simple. You have one question, one place to go, you ask the Secretary of State's Office. Dollarwise I don't believe it's going to cost that much. There's been figures thrown around, 25,000; I talked to the Secretary of State's Office this morning, he thought he could do it much less than that.
