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to be available on the web, no matter what. So you might say this is a day or two earlier than what's coming anyhow, we all know this. So it's just that simple. There's nothing special perhaps about zoning, in answer to that question.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Members of the body, Senator Schimek, I would like to ask you a question.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR KREMER: I'm not sure if I should ask this now on this amendment, or on the one to come. But I think some of the concern was with NACO and the County Officials that it would be burdensome to have to be filing this all the time. And I know there was some discussion on whether you had to file every time there was going to be a change made or proposed change? Would the filing only be on the final...the final product of the zoning regulations, when it's completed and adopted?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That's a good question, Senator. And the answer is that the amendment that will be offered will apply only to zoning rules and regulations, not to comprehensive plans or anything else.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And yes, the updates will be required. And that, I guess, that was one reason that I came down, myself, in the long-run on the side of doing it in the Secretary of State's Office, because there you have a governmental institution which will see that those updates are done. And I thought it could get...it could get questionable whether it would really get done if you just left it to a private organization to do. And I think that it is a service to those planning commissions out there, very definitely planning and zoning commissions.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay, so any...any changes in their zoning would be only filed after it was adopted by the different counties then,...
