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operations. County zoning has historically been related to building a wall around some counties to keep mega hog operations out, or seeing to it that there isn't a statewide rule and there is some way of allowing mega hog operations to have an opportunity to flourish in Nebraska and to not create a wall around the state. So the cast of characters have that characterization on them, which means to me that it's not exactly nothing special, but there's something going on there. However, let's take the idea that there isn't anything special, and that this is a nice thing to do. I think Jim's word was that this was a nice thing to do. And I can understand that. It simplifies it, puts it in one place. That doctrine of, look, it's nothing special, but it would be a nice thing to do, would be true for building codes, wouldn't it? Health codes? Yeah. In other words, if there isn't anything special about zoning, then this could be expanded to make just general the idea of a library, a centralized location for all local rules or ordinances, codes, ultimately, my guess is the Internet is going to get there ultimately. Why zoning? I think it probably has to do with mega hog operations. And two things, number one, you could have people who want to keep zoning...keep hog operations out by getting county zoning models that you could adopt someplace else. I suppose that may be true. Or maybe a mega hog operation could go to the central location and see what counties were still available for location, because there wasn't any county zoning. And then some operation who's in Detroit or Colorado would have one phone call to make because they just couldn't afford five phone calls. It would probably break the bank of that big company operating in Colorado, or Wyoming, or Kansas, to make five phone calls. And we're going to create a state entity so that this relatively large operation out of state can find one place where we have Nebraskans busy at work to create a library of local ordinances for no other special reason than it would be a nice thing to do. I don't get it? Why would we spend money to do this? There has to be more justification or, if not, then there has to be more thinking as to when we want to centralize local ordinances, codes and rules and make it across-the-board. If we like the idea that it's a library,...
