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look, we got some people in one of my counties, they wanted to do something. They came up with a 100 page bill, people didn't like it, they wished they had a centralized place to go to. And that's a place that we could make use of. It belies the committee statement, however, in which the Nebraska Association of County Officials was opposed to the bill, not for the bill, opposed to the bill. Now maybe they're in a different state now, but this bill didn't come here at the request of county officials, they came in and opposed it. Now maybe it's for the benefit of the counties and they just aren't smart enough to figure it out. And maybe the Cattlemen, the Farm Bureau, and the Pork Producers were smart enough to figure out that it was helpful for the counties, but the counties hadn't figured out yet and maybe they're changed. I was outside a moment ago. I happened to go out to talk to Jack Morse about a different bill. On my way back in I was stopped by a lobbyist and I got to say, it's a new guy, I didn't recognize him. And he said, I want to give you an answer to the question you raised on the floor. And I said, well great, but I would like to have it on the floor, thank you, I would like to have it from a colleague so it's for everyone. He said, fine, no problem. I passed by Jack Mills, from NACO, who didn't stop me, didn't ask me, and I don't think he's out there lobbying, I could be wrong, I think he's watching, but I don't see him calling people out. In other words, if it was for the counties (inaudible), they had a chance to tell me that story, they didn't. I think the representative is either from the Farm Bureau or the Cattlemen, one or the other, who's trying to lobby me out there, and I just...I still don't get it. Look, are we going to help insurance companies out by creating a centralized location for farm or fire codes in this state? I don't think so. And if one county wants a little help, guess what? That's exactly what NACO is supposed to do. They're supposed to have groups of people working together, that you don't create a state system, but they call each other up on the phone and talk to each other. They have annual conventions, they break up into various sections, and they meet and confer. This isn't for the counties, I don't think. If they were, they'd probably be asking for it far more than they are now. It's for somebody else who is not making their case on the floor, and this is where it should be made. If there's an argument for this, we ought to hear it on the floor, not out there. And if it's been made so far today, I haven't heard it,
