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portraying, because in the real world words and actions have consequences. So when a publisher prints articles that offend the readership, the readership falls off, the advertising dollars just freeze up, and all of a sudden they're out of business. We're talking about a publication that does not have consequences of the general market nature. So the real world experience that you're looking for, for students, might be better handled if we were to actually have student publications outside of the school day, sponsored by businesses or other people, and finding funding outside of tax dollars, where students would absolutely have the freedom to print what they would and live with the consequences and the funding that results from that. Now those are two choices that I think may be solutions to the problem that we're facing. We could mandate that the school boards set a policy without telling them what that policy has to be, or we could allow the students to have a real world experience in journalism outside of the school day. But I really appreciate the fact that you're willing to work with this language. And I would yield my time for you to perhaps respond to this and deal more with this maximum freedom, because I think you're willing to take that out and that's a good idea.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Redfield, were you yielding your time to Senator Beutler?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Redfield, all good points. I'm really delighted with the discussion this morning. I'm just delighted, for the first time, to get to discuss this after three or four years with the entire legislative body. And I know it is the first time that many in here have thought about this. Let me say first of all, if you took the school publications out of the school and did them privately, in conjunction with private business, that might well be an alternative. And I...you know, that's something I hadn't thought about. It would certainly change the dynamics of how it would all work and, in fact, may provide a closer real world experience, as you have described. But what I'm trying to deal with now is the way things are. And
