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was a telephone message, and I just reviewed it quickly, and I couldn't tell you.

SENATOR BOHLKE: That was today or yesterday, when the telephone message was?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes. Which goes back to the point, I think, we've had a discussion here about what the possibilities could be if this would be adopted. I mean in reality it could be that you would have a more restrictive policy than what you have today. If this is passed and school boards have the authority to set that policy, it could be more restrictive. Well, then what? Well, then what usually happens is they have to have a public hearing when they set a policy. The students, the parents, the...you know it would be the high school principal would appear before the board. They would say how they reacted to the policy that they're adopting, and they would either then go forward with that policy or not. That's the way it works. So is there a risk, I suppose, that it could be more restrictive? Possibly. But it leaves that, Senator Redfield, at the local level. It leaves that, as board policy is supposed to be set, at the local level and I think that's very important. But I think that as we talk about this, and it's necessary we talk about the ramifications, we also must remember why we have journalism classes and why we have student newspapers, why we don't let them go outside the school and just run their own ads, which they may do. There may be those publications that are out there. But certainly it's a part of the curriculum, it's usually an extracurricular activity outside of the journalism class, it's preparing students who have shown an interest in journalism and in writing. And the instruction goes to the point that at times you may write something that may be controversial but, if it's within the guidelines of the board policy, then you then live with those ramifications. If you take a position on the new mascot for the school, it could be something as...sometimes as important as that to students, as something maybe at the state level, a bill that's before the Legislature, this is part of learning good journalism and I believe very important for those students who have that interest in developing their skills so that they may continue after high
