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SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator DeCamp tried to have it done in the federal court, and his case was thrown out. But I did meticulous research and did something that the legal experts said could not be done because I respect the law, I read the law, I study the law, I understand the law, and when I apply the law I win. Even on the red light thing in Omaha, all the legal experts said that was legal, but I studied the law and saw it was not and I took it to court and I won. The Attorney General said, don't enforce that administrative license revocation, so the Omaha police didn't. I read the law and I took it to court and got a mandamus where the judge ordered them to enforce it. So I was right again, the Attorney General was wrong, the county attorneys were wrong, and the legal staff in Omaha were wrong, Senator Bourne. I have the record to show what it is that I do. But all we're looking at here is an amendment to state explicitly that this bill will not be retroactive,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and I hope you will support it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Tyson, on the amendment to the amendment.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senator Chambers alleges that I used the word "fear". I did, that's what I said. It is a synonym, in this particular case, for caution. We do not lightly change the law. Now Senator Chambers has just argued that he was successful in a number of cases, and then he uses the fallacy of transference: I was right then, so I'm right now. Wrong. Again, and I'll make this very brief, we should change the law when the law needs changing. The people who apply this law argue that it does not need changing in this instance. I argued earlier that I would take counsel of my fears. Okay, I will amend that. I will be very, very cautious about how I vote. I will be very cautious in being part of changing a law that in my view does not need changing. Laissez faire, let it act. Thank you.
