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had been sexually assaulted, beaten, her throat was cut, and one man got life and another got a lesser sentence. So there is a lot of posturing on this floor and in society at large, and which shows that Senator Matzke is kind of out of touch with what's happening in the world now, Senator Matzke, felony child abuse does not occur in the vast majority of cases or any that I'm aware of where a child has been kidnapped. There are boyfriends, who are in the house, in the homes, who do this. There are stepfathers who do it. There are even mothers who do it. There are biological fathers who do it. Sexual assaults, for Senator Matzke's information, are sometimes committed by parents against their own children, and there is no kidnapping involved. And he also made a misstatement when he said two-thirds of the homicide cases in this count...in this state are based on felony murder. That is not true at all. That's totally false. That is totally and absolutely false but you listen to what he says and you accept it as fact. He doesn't have to state facts. He can say whatever pops into his head.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD PRESIDING

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So he is wrong on the number of felony murders that are charged in this state. He is wrong on how the majority of sexual assaults of a child occur in this state. And he is wrong in terms of the number and how and the circumstances under which felony child abuse will occur. I want those things into the record, not that they are going to change anybody's mind here, but they will demonstrate how inaccurately people who are on a political issue can speak and get away with it if I don't call attention to it. Am I jousting at windmills based on the issues that I bring before the Legislature? Who knows. All I know is that I'm always going to do that which I think is right and appropriate to be done if I'm the only one attempting to do it. But the county attorneys,...
