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SENATOR BRASHEAR: That's what the bill would change, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And isn't that an easier thing to prove than...

SENATOR BRASHEAR: You're right, yes, I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to prove that some...

SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...see where you are going. I understand the question.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if the felony murder, if the felony is easier to prove, it makes the felony murder easier to prove. So, in fact, we are talking about the death penalty on that issue too, aren't we?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Members of the Legislature, well, my time is probably up. I won't speak again until I close.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. President, members of the body, I want to utilize this opportunity. Senator Chambers has brought up something that I think the body should be aware of and which we are aware of on the Judiciary Committee, and I don't want it just be Senator Chambers who is saying it. You all ought to know it as you deal with your constituents and as you make your speeches on the floor and as you talk about the death penalty. The lethal injection bill, which is mine, which is pending before the body, won't solve what anybody I've seen discussing in the media thinks it will solve because a death warrant in the state of Nebraska says you are sentenced to die by electrocution at such and such a time and place. And Senator Chambers is correct, and I've been saying this, and I want to promote the understanding among the members of the body that you are not going to save what is right about or wrong with the death
