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penalty. We've remained one of the, what, three states in the United States of America still using electrocution. If that...if that is ruled unconstitutional by the United States Supreme Court based upon how it is or isn't applied or whatever other legal issues are involved, you will not be able to take the LB that I have introduced, even if you were to pass it, and immediately execute those people or ever execute those people by lethal injection. They've been sentenced and I think it's important that we understand that because sometimes in the press releases and, you know, they are doing in Florida, so we've got to do it here because it's the right thing to do, people ignore a few of the legal niceties that are involved. And, yes, you can start thinking about the issue because it will affect each and every person sitting on death row now, and I thought you should have that information, and this was an opportune time to present it to you. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, in my mind is a picture, and I may wind up drawing this cartoon, two bad little boys in short pants and patent leather shoes jumping up and down, shrieking at the top of their little voices, faces blood red, carotid arteries standing out on their neck and pulsing...by the way, that provides a state trooper with sufficient basis to search your car if the veins in your neck are pulsing and you won't make eye contact. But one of the people...one of the little boys will be Mike Johanns and the other little boy will be Don Stenberg, and Stenberg will be just jumping up and down screaming and saying, I want to throw the switch, I want to throw the switch. And Johanns will say, no, and have a big hypodermic needle, no, I want to stick him, I want to stick him, I want to stick him. And then some of my colleagues, and I can draw pictures that look like people, but I won't put names on them, cheering, and some will say, I'm for Don, I'm for Don, and the others say, I'm for Johanns, I'm for Johanns, stick him, stick him, let me pull the switch. You know, when you really think about it, that does make you proud. Makes me...I haven't said this in my life, but it makes me proud to be not only a Nebraskan, but proud to be an American. That's what America is about. As I think about it, it's really a great
