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were "overappropriated" there, we take that back and then the community college aid, which is the Governor's proposal of \$30 million, that takes us down to line 29, which shows that we are \$12 million, \$12,309,000, below the minimum reserve, or we are at 2.74 percent, which you recall we need to be at 3.0 percent or above. So the point being that doing all of the deficits that we are absolutely required to do and on that sheet, the second sheet of the handout, does show what those deficit requests are and they total approximately, once again, the \$76 million. The top lines, the lines that are shown there are in order of their dollar amount, so Medicaid deficit shows up at this point at \$32.4 million; the public assistance child-care welfare issue is \$24.6 million; employee health costs for the University of Nebraska is \$8.5 million in requests, at this point we've got it funded at 4, if you look at the right-hand side; and the low-level nuclear waste issue, which is a lawsuit that we are involved in, is \$39,097,000, or actually \$4 million. Those top four constitute over 90 percent of our deficit requests. The others, as you go on down, you can see yourself, but they are much, much, much less. And so those four issues are the crux of our dilemma that we're going to have to face because we must fund those. I will say the committee is having hearings on these in the next two weeks. We are going to be looking at ways that we can make adjustments, reduce, stop it in the future, whatever, but at this point it looks very difficult. I do have a bill in Health and Human Services Committee on the child-care issue, but that will be subject to hearing and to the body if we are to make adjustments. But, at this point, this is the line that we're on. What it really says, if I may jump to the bottom line, is that either we do not...are not able to do the property tax relief as proposed, or we dig deeper into the Cash Reserve, and the Cash Reserve status is on the bottom of the page and does show that where we are at, at the present time. We ended last year, June 30th, with \$145 million in the Cash Reserve, or savings account, sometimes it's easier to understand. And at this rate, the proposals are, with the Governor's proposals and so forth, we will end up with \$115 million in the Cash Reserve as of June 30, 2001, which ends this biennium. So we are pulling down on the Cash Reserve under the present circumstances and so you recognize how that's done. Now at this point we're analyzing the Governor's proposals, we are looking at our own proposals, and we will be spending the
