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next month looking at this. So I want you to understand, once again, this is an example. It's not an exact status. We've made some fine tuning already within it, but basically these are fairly accurate and they're within about \$1 million of the Governor's budget. If you want to pull out his budget, which you have in your drawer, the numbers come out about the same, although we are a little different in the way we get there. So if you have questions, why, ask the Fiscal Office if you want to understand better where we're headed, but just suffice it to say that the enormous amount of deficits we have in primarily two programs--child welfare, a child-care issue, and the Medicaid issue, which is health insurance--and we're digging...or, not health, which is medical concerns, we're digging into those issues very deeply but both of those are entitlement programs at this point. With that, Mr. Speaker, I will conclude my remarks for this morning.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Beutler, do you desire to be recognized for a point of personal privilege?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I do. I just wanted to add a couple of comments. First of all to indicate, as most of you know, this is the first go-round for me on the Appropriations Committee and watching the process, and they do, in fact, work very hard. This is the first deficit session and it's been interesting for me to find out what deficit means. I think for some of you it means things that were mistakenly left out of the budget last time around. Does it include that? I think for some of you it means items that came up since the last year and require expenditures. Does it mean that? I think probably most of us would agree it probably includes those two things, but I'm also discovering that it's not a limited term of art. It includes a lot of new spending also; spending that, because of the nature of the process, tends to be suggested by the Governor. The Governor has recommended, for example, a new juvenile facility completely different from anything that we've ever had before that costs over a million dollars that nobody has heard of before, which is all right. I mean, Governors propose things all the time. But the end result of what's happened with this Governor and, to a large extent, with the last Governor and it seems to be a continuing process is that the Governors find out
