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that don't make sense and the law should not get involved. There are family relationships that need to be worked out within the family, and if they cannot, the state stays out of it. Now I'm not talking about where there's abuse and mistreatment, but where you have relationships that are supposed to be based on respect, nurturing, love, if there is such a thing, whatever it is, the state cannot impose that. And we have people on the floor saying, well, we trust the judge to do this, that and the other. Well, there are judges who do blunder. And I filed a complaint against a judge who showed his disrespect for a person before him in a domestic situation. But he was going contrary to the statute, when he did that, in his ethics. This bill puts things into the law that invite very serious, existing problems...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to aggravate and become increasingly severe. And unlike the situation where you're taking Bayer aspirin and the condition persists and becomes increasingly severe and you can go see the doctor, there is no doctor to go to here. Somebody might be going to the undertaker. And there are people who are just too meddlesome and "busybodyish" and I think the law should not become that way. So, as I said, I'll be offering amendments as we go on. But I think there should be some general discussion of the whole waterfront first.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. (Doctor of the day introduced.) Continued discussion on the committee amendments to LB 120, Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Mr. Lieutenant Governor and members, there is an old saying that the most important thing in life is not to be afraid to be human. And if we accept that, we also have to accept the fact that all husbands and wives, or wives, or husbands, or families get along, very well sometimes. And in almost every case, on occasion, sooner or later there are going to be some disagreements, sometimes terrible and violent disagreements. And I also think that we would have to be hypocrites if we didn't believe that the abuse of children also takes place in what's called whole families, with mothers and fathers. They both might not abuse, but sometimes one tolerates
