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moved the child, the fact that the child has moved over there is going to be used against the mother from whom the child was taken improperly, and the male judge said, so since that's where the child is now, that's where custody should be transferred. Now suppose you had something additional, like this law purports to do, then the statute is involved. You know why the court cannot get in and tell this man, love that woman, cherish that woman and, even if you don't, act like it? Because there is nothing in the law that mandates it. This is a mandate. This is the law saying it shall be done this way. The judge has the power and the force of the state is behind him or her. That's where the difference is. We are creating a mandated situation, and I intend to oppose it tooth and nail, as I always have on these bills. It happens that Senator Crosby is bringing it this time. And I'm not going to talk always about the good intentions of people who bring bills, because it will be...let me give you an example. When Toussaint L'Ouverture was fighting in Haiti, and they were going to win, he had, for want of a better word, a commander of his army, named Dessalines. And when Dessalines was giving a talk and all these men, the followers, were listening, he'd make a comment and they would clap and cheer. So he let them do it a few times. He said, that is not wise. He said, because it gives the impression that you cheer only when you agree. So if I make a statement and you dis...and you don't cheer at me, it means you disagree. And if you disagree with your commander, that can have dire consequences. So either you're going to cheer for everything, or you're going to cheer for nothing. And they chose to cheer for nothing. So we have this kind of situation where sometimes we might say this senator has good intentions. Then that old wily fox, Senator Bromm, sitting over there, and he is old wily fox, and sometimes a shrewd, cunning old devil, too, while he's at it. We'll say, well...I'm not going to say he has good intentions. So if I've been saying it about everybody else, the failure to say it there suggests something. I really get along well with Senator Crosby, too. I've probably hugged her more times than anybody in the Legislature. And, if I haven't, I'm going to find out how far behind I am and I'll make up for it before she gets out of the Legislature and set the record. But all of that has nothing to do with this bill. If my...if the mother of my granddaughter did not like me, for whatever reason, and did not want me to see my granddaughter, I would never go to
