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court and force it. My granddaughter is not going to be a child all the time. This is the way I operate, and I know other people don't operate in the way that I do. When my granddaughter is old enough to make a decision, then she'll come around me if she wants to, and if she chooses not to I'm not going to compel her. I wouldn't want a law that could compel a woman to marry me, if I wanted her to marry me, as happened in some societies, or where a parent can say I'm going to dictate whom you shall marry. We always say that's crazy, those things shouldn't happen.

SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But the same attitude exists in this society. The meddlesomeness, the "busybodyness", the saying that, even though I don't know the individual circumstances of people's situation, I want a mandatory law that's going to treat all of these situations the same. And then when these complaints start coming in to me, there are not other senators I can refer them to, and I tell them, I was against that in the first place, go find the senators who supported it. But if I can be of help to them, I try.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. We are now discussing the Chambers amendment to the committee amendments to LB 120. Those wishing to speak are Senator Crosby, Senator Don Pederson, Senator Brashear, Senator Beutler and Senator Chambers. Senator Crosby, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. President and members. Senator Chambers raises some points having to do with the behavior...with human behavior that none of us can overlook, because you can't...we all admit and know you can't legislate human behavior. But remember that this bill is based on the fact, based on the premise that we should be looking at the best interests of the children when it comes to joint custody. And, of course, there are two kinds of joint custody--legal joint custody, where they simply make decisions, joint decisions on medical and education and so on; and physical, where they actually live in one house for a while, and one house in the
