SENATOR CUDABACK: Any discussion? Any discussion? Seeing none, Senator Jensen? He waives closing. The question is adoption of the report by the Health and Human Services Committee. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Record vote, Legislative Journal page 439.) 34 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of the Health and Human Services report.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Report is adopted. Madam Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: Next report is Todd Stuckey to the Rural Health Advisory Commission.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Jensen, to open on your report.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President. This is...the next confirmation is to Todd Stuckey. He's an M.D. to the Rural Health Advisory Commission. Dr. Stuckey is in family practice, a residency here in Lincoln. He is enrolled in the Rural Health Opportunities Program, R-HOP as we refer to it, and plans on graduating to practice in rural Nebraska. This is one of those programs, by the way, that the Legislature here did set up to bring physicians back into the rural community, and it's a program, by the way, that I think is working very well; very proud of that. Dr. Stuckey is a new appointment to the commission, and is a member of the Nebraska and American Medical Associations. I present to you for confirmation Dr. Todd Stuckey to the Rural Health Advisory Commission, Mr. President.
