CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Beutler's amendment.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Smith, you're recognized for a motion to advance.

SENATOR SMITH: Mr. Speaker, I'd move the advancement of LB 289 to E & R for engrossing.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Landis, on advancement. Yes, Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: I was talking to Senator Bromm, wasn't I? I didn't listen that you had called on me.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: It was a fine opening. (Laughter)

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you. I have my light on. Am I recognized?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Yes, your time is running.

SENATOR LANDIS: All right, I think I've got this now. Counties voluntarily send to the state their zoning regulations making a central voluntary repository at a cost of some 20,000 bucks. Now I'd asked, on General File, why? And I got back the answer, because county officials would be able to look at this location for other models. I think Senator Baker said, look, I've just called a county official and they said, you know, if that existed, I might be able to make use of it. The bill came in with the objection of the County Officials Association, who have moved now to a neutral stance but, frankly, I've talked to the county officials and they don't want...they're indifferent to the bill. They don't ask for the bill. They are neutral
