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serve this purpose for their members. We know that when businesses come in they are very interested in the tax breaks in different locations, they're interested in a lot of other rules and regulations, and they go to the State Chamber of Commerce and ask the answers to that question. We had, under the discussion earlier, the fact that NACO does exist to serve its members so that counties can go and get this information if the purpose of this bill is to serve the county officials. I'm not sure that we want to expand our policy decisions as a state to becoming a repository for all information because it won't end here. If we're going to put this kind of information in the Secretary of State's Office, there are going to be legitimate reasons to ask other information to be placed there as well, and we have to decide whether we want to bear the cost. We had an A bill of \$24,000 for this one purpose, whether it's lower or not, I don't know for sure. I do know that the cost will raise year by year as inflation raises the cost of salaries, so I think that's a question we should be asking ourselves today, is this a policy that we want to encourage because it's going to grow, it's going to reach into other areas, and this is going to become a library. Is that the purpose we want to serve today? Thank you.

**SPEAKER KRISTENSEN:** Senator Bromm.

**SENATOR BROMM:** Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I really haven't been very involved with this and I have been trying to listen and I was waiting...I had the same question, basically, I think Senator Landis had. And so you have to evaluate, I have to evaluate whether or not the answers are compelling enough to support the bill. Even though it is a small cost, it's still a cost, it's still government, it's still paperwork, it's still another requirement for filing, and I think we need to do that kind of thing only where there is a compelling need or a compelling reason to do it. Our budget is built in little pieces and a little piece here and a little piece there and pretty soon it's real money. It's not a big cost, but it's a cost and, is it worth it? I guess where I...what kind of got my attention is that the last three or four years, we've been dealing with zoning. We have maintained pretty steadfastly that zoning is a local issue, that we will not, on the state level, interfere or replace local judgment with our judgment when it
