State. Frankly, I had originally, and the committee knows this, I had originally suggested that the NACO, the Nebraska Association of County Officials, be the repository for all this information. They weren't excited about it because, I understand, they were going to have volumes and volumes of paper they were going to deal with. It doesn't make any difference to me who it goes to. I just feel like, as has been talked about here, that it does give a central place where these counties that have not finished or who want to update their thing can look at other counties, see what they're doing, without having to make calls to various other counties, because there are differences in the way counties do their zoning. I've talked to some counties who have zoned that have different requirements than others. This gives a composite for everybody to take a look when they make...when they're trying to make their plans or make their changes or whatever they are attempting to do with their zoning regulations. And so that's all we're really looking at is the regulations that are involved in the zoning process, and it does give a central place for everybody to have access to. It makes it much easier for those who are now in the process of trying to get zoned. And I agree with Senator Kremer, this is probably going to slowly dissolve because of the fact that everybody eventually is going to be zoned, and they won't...the only thing that's going to happen, there probably will continue to be counties who will maybe want to make changes, want to fine tune or refine their zoning regulations. They can then go to the central depository and take a look at what other counties have done that they may be thinking about and how is it working. That information will be available. So, sure, they may have to end up talking to that county, but before they do that, they will be able to look at what is actually happening. So I support this...this piece of legislation, and as I said before, I don't care who...where the repository is, or where the things are filed, it's just that it would make it so much more advantageous to have a central place, rather than have them scattered all over the 93 counties. And so with that, I'm going to continue to support the bill the way its been amended, because I think that it's in good enough shape that it should, in fact, be moved forward.
