SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, and that's all that I want to make clear so that, again, with the negotiating that I've been doing around here, I don't want it to seem like I'd say if you do this, then I will do that. I want it clear that there was no agreement that I would support this bill. There are other amendments that were brought to me by a representative who was representing the landlords, and what they want to try to do is say that after a summons is issued to a person, that person has three days from receipt of that summons to get in court and say they're going to contest it. So a lot of this involves poor people and you get the summons on Friday. Saturday is one day, Sunday is two days, Monday is the third day and you don't even know what all this means anyway, you are probably going to have to go to legal aid. If I have information correct about Omaha, to get into their legal aid clinic, that occurs on a Wednesday. And I am not going to let this bill go. Now if you all want to take the time on it, you can do it, and if this is interpreted as a threat, that's fine. I told Mr. Radcliffe that with his position, I want to leave the law the way it is, and I think he said, well, that's okay because he wasn't going to yield on anything, and he is the one driving this bill. That's really why it's before us today. It was not to be acted on last year. It wound up on the agenda somehow but it was taken off. So here it is again, and I'll tell you, brothers and sisters, what I will do during the first eight hours of this discussion. Landlords have an unsavory reputation everywhere, but none, nowhere is it as unsavory as it is in Ireland. And I plan to take a little time to show you all that I'm aware of the plight of other people than those of my complexion. I am aware, although I am not an expert on it, of the history that brings people and countries to the position they are in now. Oh, I'd love to have the opportunity to talk about the battle of the Boyne in 1690, and I'd like to have the opportunity to point out why those Orangemen want to march every July 12th. I want to point out why Irish people became tenants in their own land; why and how Ireland became a country where the people at large had to count on a single crop, and that crop being potatoes because it's the only crop that would grow in sufficient quantity for them to grow enough to feed their families. But there were other large farms and large estates producing diversified crops and livestock but those were not owned by the indigenous Irish
