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the bracket motion, we won't have that, certainly we won't have that opportunity this time. And someone had made the comment into the microphone, you know, is this the bill to, you know, go eight hours on. Well, you know, that's a decision that, frankly, you will have to make. But this is a legitimate bill. The amendments make it better, make it a better bill. The amendments will make this bill in the shape that I think the body, as a whole, could support. Maybe one, or two, or three senators may not support it, but I think the amendments adopted puts it into a condition that the vast majority of this body could support. So to bracket this bill right now and to simply say, well, we're not going to deal with this because a few people have some concerns with the original bill before we even have had a chance to amend it, I think, frankly, does not do good for our process. We have a process here. I think we ought to have it...give it a chance to work and I don't think supporting the bracket motion is best, certainly not for this bill, but I don't think it's best that any bill that comes up that any individual senator doesn't like won't let it get debated, won't let it get amended, won't let it get approved. This, basically, gives basically veto power. So it's your decision to make. I'm not going to speak multiple times on the bracket motion. Let's get it to a vote. If the body wants to go that route, I would not advise it. I think the body should reject the bracket motion and we'll let others consume the time. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Hilgert. (Visitors introduced.) Thank you. Senator Chambers, you are next to speak.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I catch, I catch flak from all sides. Not only do I have to listen to Senator Hilgert in front but "Baron" Tyson is catching me on my flank. But at any rate, since you have two...you've got a brain divided in half, I give one half to Senator Hilgert, the other half to Senator Tyson, and each is far more than adequate for the job at hand. But here's what I'm offering, and I'm making it clear. Stay with me for eight hours so I can talk about Ireland, and after I finish that, I'll talk about other oppressed peoples, and I can think of no bill better to do it on than a landlord bill, where Senator Landis points out it's
