would never do it, even if I were a dictator. I would encourage the proliferation of churches. I would encourage people to have faith in whatever God they believed in. Then, when they petition me, I would say pray to the one that you believe is in charge of everything; don't ask me for everything. You say the cattle on a thousand hills belong to the one you're praying to, then why do you come to me for a hamburger?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Go to the one who owns everything. The point that I'm going to make on this particular amendment though, and I will talk about some problems that the Irish had, even though this bill will not be voted on ultimately, as we proceed the Legislature can make a statement about some of these issues. So this amendment that I'm offering would take away the requirement that any deposit be placed with a landlord by a person who has any of these dogs who are there to aid because of blindness, partial blindness, hearing impairment, or physical disability.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. (Doctor of the day and visitors introduced.) Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, I'm having handed around an article that appeared in this morning's paper and the headline is "Tenants' Deposits May Rise". And the article says, in one of the paragraphs, "it appears there may be support for the bill which was expected to be considered again today. An attempt to delay debate on the bill until March 5th was rejected on a 30 to 3 vote." Here is what I have written on the sheet that I'm handing around to you all: Colleagues, I am not unmindful of the fact that the lopsided vote against my bracket motion was not a show of support of the bill but rather the Legislature's "Declaration of Independence", vis-a-vis me. But even in declaring your independence you established and demonstrated my control. How can such a thing be when I suffered such a lopsided defeat? Well, when you cast that vote, and I saw the names of people who were against this bill so that's why I know what the vote was for, you voted against your interest, not mine. How can giving me a nothing bill like this for eight hours be a vote against my interest? What it does is show that I do, indeed, control.
