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so. Nobody, other than Senator Hilgert and Senator Quandahl, probably have a great amount of their person involved in this. Nobody else, if this bill went away, would feel a disintegration of their personality or a diminution of their ego. But when you have offered a bill, then those things might be associated with the fate of that bill. I don't think there's any need for me to explain again what the amendment does because it is clear, but for the record I'm going to state how we will proceed or how we are proceeding in discussing this bill. The only thing before us right now is the first division of the committee amendments. There are three divisions and each one...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...can be amended as it comes before us, and I'm going to do that. If we get past the committee amendments, then the bill itself would be discussed and open to additional amendment, so there is more than enough time, there are more than enough opportunities for me to consume the eight hours. If Senator Hilgert and Senator Quandahl are intent on offering their amendments, when we get to some of these other divisions they will have the opportunity to present their amendment to that particular division. So they will have the opportunity to have their amendment discussed, but whether or not they'll get to vote on it remains a question. I know there are people who wonder how, under the rules, certain things can be done and if some things would not be rendered impossible, but after Senator Quandahl offers his amendment, or his might be to the bill itself.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And this is to close, isn't it?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: As soon as I recognize you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, I thought you called me.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: No, I thanked you for your last...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, okay.
