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about vetoes. So, there are going to be some battles this session on various issues and maybe others will sit back and say, since the Governor is over there in that office and does have the power to veto for any reason or no reason, they're going to take low, but I'm not. Will I have any bills that pass this session? I hope so. If any of my bills pass, will they wind up on the Governor's desk? Of a certainty they will. Will the Governor veto them? In his pettiness, probably so. Will his petty action wound my heart, chill my spirit and...that was Senator Tyson who threw that "yes" in there. Certainly not. I will be here long after he is gone, so none of those considerations enter in. As these matters come before us, I'm going to take them on and deal with them as they arise. But back to what I was saying. Getting away from the worsening situation in Northern Ireland, I will come back to this bill. And I hook the two together because landlords play a particularly pernicious role in the history of Ireland, so it is appropriate that I mention certain things in that regard. This bill wanted to raise an amount of property that the landlord could filch from \$250 to \$1,000, and I don't think that is good policy. I have to check my language in the bill itself for a second. This is that property which all the landlord has to do is say he or she believes it's a certain value, if I'm looking at the right thing. Yes. And I think that is particularly abhorrent, so I'm going to work my way through that provision, dealing with the amounts first, then with the text of the existing law. And it may take a bit of time but it will compile a record, not only of my opposition but which the landlord class, the landlord caste, the landlord elitists can consider, so that they may understand that amendments of a different kind may be offered to the law which will not give them a greater advantage than they have now but begin to chip away at some of the unjust advantages they have managed to accumulate down through the years. And my discussion is designed to compile that record.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Less than a minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It is not expected that anybody's mind will be changed, but when that record is compiled those who represent these landlords can show them what any bill they bring is going to be subjected to. Thank you, Mr. President.
