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without seeing it. Thank you, Senator Tyson. Members of the Legislature, there was in England a civil war as there was one in the United States. And the English civil war took place in the mid-1600's as the American Civil War took place in the mid-...a little past the mid-1800's. There was a guy named Chas. or Charles, Charles the I, but some people say "the first", because his last name was a Roman numeral one, and he was a Catholic. And he was the king of England. He was executed. Those...there were people who believed in capital punishment then as they believe in it now. And poor Charles probably presided over a lot of executions, as every monarch did in England, because they really believed in the death penalty. So Charles was executed and the monarchy was overthrown. There were people in Ireland who were loyal to the monarchy. And they were going to pay for it dearly before it was over. When the monarchy was deposed, a person came along who was loved by all, a movie or a play was even made after somebody with his first name Oliver, but I don't know if it's the same person. This person's last name was Cromwell, and he was a commoner, he was a soldier, he turned into a statesman, and he became the Lord Protector of England, Scotland and Ireland. And he was the one who put down many Irish insurrections. Whenever these Irish dissidents would try to show any backbone or spunk, Cromwell knew how to put them down, because he was a soldier. And he would use what was described as savage means to put them down. During his tenure, which was not loved by all, about 100,000 Irish people were deported. That became a way to get rid of all of the troublemakers. Now this kind of activity was continued by his successors, but nothing remains the same all the time. Somebody wishes they could get to an amendment, which they will be able to directly. Cromwell died. There was a guy who was a convert who became king, his name was James. And in the same way that Charles was Charles "One" I, James was James "Two" I or two Roman numerals, two capital Roman numeral I's to represent him. In 1688 he abdicated to Ireland and began to talk to the malcontents and said that if he could get enough good men, strong-hearted men, Catholics, they could do something about changing the way things were going. So in 1690, on the banks of the Boyne River there was a battle. There was a Catholic army that had 21,000 people, mainly French and Irish. Coming against them was a Protestant army of 35,000. After James had left, the English asked a guy who was Dutch, William of Orange, to take
