made clear to everybody. And from my point of view, I believe there are underlying grievances in addition to religion, but religion is the fire that keeps everything in an uproar. And to me religion doesn't amount to a hill of beans, doesn't mean anything. You know who wins wars? Not the one who has God on their side, the one who has the most troops, the most armament and the greatest ability to fight; or those who, with a smaller force but better equipment or the element of surprise, knowing strategy and tactics may win. But God has nothing to do with any of it. All God does is start the wars and then sits back and watches. Why would I say God starts the wars? Because each side says God is on their side, and if God is on their side and they believe in God and trust God, they're not going to do anything God didn't tell them to do. So, we have these kind of situations that happened centuries ago. That was the wind. The whirlwind is sown, is reaped, and the carryovers from those days have an impact today. "Landlordism" got its bad name and its bad reputation in Ireland. Are Irish people all saints? Certainly not. Are there Irish people who were foolish and others who were fools? Certainly. Can those things be said about any group? Absolutely. Is there any group that has fought so persistently, so consistently against themselves for so long, uninterruptedly as the Irish? Maybe so, I don't know. But it would seem to me that that tortured, blood-stained country could serve as an example for everybody. If family can fight like that among and against each other, what about strangers? Well strangers are too smart. Strangers will not let the bond become as deep as it might with families, so if it's broken, there is not the same degree of bitterness. You're most bitter toward those you thought you had the most in common with, and you feel they betrayed you. And that's why some guy wrote, I don't know if it was John Donne, heaven hath no fury, heaven hath no hatred, hell hath no hatred, something hath no hatred like love to hatred turn, nor hell of fury like a woman scorned. You see how they put down women? Women are not the ones maintaining the war in Ireland. Women are saying stop, stop it, and women have always said that.
