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astronomical. If a person is without shelter and the places where shelter is to be obtained are controlled by exploitive, gouging people, those exploiters and gougers will charge all the traffic will bear. Do they care that some people will not be able to afford shelter under those circumstances? Not at all. They will tell you quickly that they are not in the business of charity, they're in the business of making as much money as they possibly can. And this is one of the reasons that if somebody moves out of an apartment it can never have been cleaned sufficiently, it can never have been treated with enough care for the tenant to be entitled to a refund of that security deposit. Since the money is given to the landlord and the landlord makes use of it, there should be a provision where the landlord would have to pay interest for the period of time that he or she held that amount. But the way the landlord would get around that is say, well, there isn't any money coming back because it had to be used to clean the place, to replace this, to replace that, to repair the other. Most tenants, when they go into these places to lease, do not photograph the place. They do not make out a list, pointing out problems, and have the landlord to sign the list. They are somewhat naive in the ways of being gouged and cheated, so they take the landlord at his or her untrustworthy word. They're happy to get the place. It may be their first step out on their own, so they enter an agreement, they pay the security deposit, because they were well reared at home and taught to respect other people's property and return it in a like condition to that in which it was when they received it. They take care of it, no damage, nothing dirty, walls not broken, nothing. But when they go back to the landlord to settle up, they don't get their deposit back, and the landlord says, well sue me. And then as if the landlord is going to be an advisor, the poor, naive tenant says, well how can I sue you, I can't get a lawyer? The landlord says, that's your problem, not mine, that's why I'm going to keep this money, and the landlord keeps it. Tenants don't get it. What some people ought to do is go to that university and tell them they should assume some obligation on behalf of their students, and they should survey these places where the students rent, and they should find out how many of those...
