SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Discussion on LB 864, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, Madam President, I was speaking so much yesterday and got in kind of a zone and a habit, so please forgive me for that slip. I would like to ask Senator Pedersen a question.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Pedersen, will you yield for a question?

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Yes, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Pedsen (phonetic), I'm just repeating what I heard. What I would like to ask you is, how is it determined that a person is under the influence of drugs? With alcohol there is a certain concentration of alcohol in the blood which leads to that determination. So can you tell us how it is determined if a person is under the influence of a drug or drugs?

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Yes, with alcohol you test with body fluids or breath, breath, blood or urine. With other drugs, it is done, basically, with urine is the best thing to use for drugs but blood can also be used.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How do they...well, let me ask you this, and these are serious questions. If a person is found to have alcohol in his or her blood, urine or breath, that alone does not determine that a person is under the influence. There has to be a certain concentration, .01. Is that what it is or .1 or whatever it is. I'm not...

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Point, one.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...okay. You can have, if you're an adult, a concentration of alcohol in your blood at any level below that and you cannot be charged with being under the influence, is that correct?
