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do believe that the parties were instituted to serve the democracy and I'm interested in seeing that they are not weakened any further. And I think this is a continuing problem with the growth of special interest groups in our country. But the main point that I wanted to get to is that I think parties are also interested in finding good candidates. And without the party's apparatus to look for candidates, I'm not exactly sure how people get encouraged to run. Now I have...I have run a statewide race. It was a losing race but I ran it and it was a fun thing to do. It was a hard...a lot of hard work. I don't know if I could have attempted that without any party apparatus there. It's very, very, very difficult to run a statewide race, no matter how you cut it, and particularly for some of these offices below the Governor's Office. The Governor's Office gets lots of attention but I don't think that State Treasurer gets lots of attention. I don't think the Secretary of State gets lots of attention. And even Attorney General does not get as much attention as it probably should have. So I think that that would be rather detrimental to a candidate thinking about running for Attorney General if there was no party apparatus there. Another point is that I think the party label is a yardstick for the voters. And when you're talking about these statewide races, they don't know these candidates. And if you've got a party label, that gives them at least a little bit of indication, maybe, about philosophy. It's very different at the legislative level where you know a lot of your constituents. In this case, it's statewide and it's more difficult. I think the parties are probably going to be involved anyway. I mean you can make it a nonpartisan race but I think it will end up just like legislative races and the parties will be out there looking for candidates, financing candidates, what-have-you. I'm not certain that this will do what people are wanting it to do. I don't think the nonpartisan label is going to assure that we have competency or that we have independence in our Attorney General. I mean maybe there will be other groups that will have a particular interest in getting a particular person elected Attorney General. Maybe these will be special interest groups, and maybe they will have money that they can do that with. I don't know. But the parties are a public process. They are a public institution, and they have that winnowing out process I think that's very necessary to all of us. So I just thank you for listening to me...
