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like they have in Iowa, which I don't think mean anything, or the people up in New Hampshire. I happen to have been...I've sent a little bit of money to Senator McCain because I do admire him, but the people in New Hampshire can vote however they want to. So did that say anything? Let me remind you who won that Republican primary in New Hampshire the last time around, Pat Buchanan. So you see, I don't think those things, when it is thrown into a melting pot of I believe whatever I believe and I will vote however I want to, that that gives any strength to the system. I don't think it gives any strength to the system. The country, as a whole, and our state, as a whole, operates on the two-party system. We have the precinct workers. We have the precinct committee man and woman. We have a county convention. We have a state convention in each party. Then we have the national convention which chooses presidential candidates. So I don't think...I just don't like the idea of diluting that system, and this, for me, is one of those little chips that come along and then later on they think, well, we'll look at some of the other offices and take away the party designation. So I'm going to vote against this bill...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CROSBY: ...and I do think...I hope a lot of you join us voting against it. You will notice, the last thing I'll say is there was only one person who came in for this bill, aside from Senator Chambers, himself. The man that came in against it happens to be a friend, a neighbor, a constituent of mine. I know him at church. He ran for Attorney General and lost. Does that tell you anything? And, Allan, forgive me, but when I am next to you, I will apologize if that makes you feel like I'm not...I was against you, but the point is that someone who comes in for something like this, that has already run for the office and lost, then it makes you wonder if there isn't some little reason there, and he's active in his own party. He is active in the Democrat Party, always has been. So having said all those things, which probably don't make much sense to you, but I've worked in the Republican politics since I was 18 and I'm going to hang in with them. And so I'll vote against this bill.
