not. The Attorney General's Office is a legal office. I'm glad that Senators Kristensen and Pederson began to focus in, oh, and Senator Beutler and Senator Wickersham, the duties of an attorney first, and the legal advice which is to be given to all of the agencies and branches of the state government should not be affected by a person's political affiliation, and I'm sure that people might feel better if they knew that the one giving that advice did not have to run under the party label. I'd like to correct a misunderstanding that I think Senator Lynch has about that constitutional amendment that was proposed. Senator Lynch, it does not say that a member of the Legislature cannot run for another office. It does not say that the person cannot win the other office. It says that prior to the commencement of the legislative session that person would have to resign from the Legislature so that that person would not be, say, holding the position of another constitutional officer and still, when the Legislature convenes, be a member of the Legislature and participate in legislative activities until the day that he or she is sworn in into that other office. So that is what that constitutional amendment says, not that a person in the Legislature cannot run for or win another office. There are attorneys who will not run for Attorney General because of the requirement of declaring a political affiliation. They don't advertise their party affiliation in their practice and if they were to run for Attorney General and had to put it out then they are elevating the party affiliation above their qualifications as an attorney. There was another point that I want to make to Senator Vrtiska, and I call it the Vrtiska principle. He said that, even though he hadn't made up his mind on this bill completely, he put it out here because everybody should have the opportunity to discuss this bill. The reason for the bill, Senator Vrtiska, is to give everybody a chance to vote for the candidates running for Attorney General. When it's done on a party label, a partisan basis, an independent cannot vote for the Republican side or the Democrat side, and the people in those parties cannot vote except for the ones running on the party label. The only way, Senator Smith, a person who is not a Democrat or a Republican can have access to the ballot is by way of circulating a petition and that stops a lot of people from having that opportunity. I want to hit one or two things without argument. This bill will not and it should not prohibit the political parties from participating actively in anybody's
