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SENATOR SCHIMEK: No, I...I appreciate...

SENATOR LYNCH: But I...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...the question, Senator, but, again, I mean they keep all kinds of data. I will...I will try to get some very specific answers for you, but I personally don't have those answers right now.

SENATOR LYNCH: H'm. I...well, I was curious, especially if it had to do anything with personnel data within DAS, because we're talking about a \$32 million data processing system that will be developed to manage personnel programs for the state, not the university employees. They've already have their system in place. And it talks about here how they have worked together. It said the university may already utilize the state's purchasing agreements, so apparently they do things together, but I'm not quite sure where that begins and where it ends, and it seems that we change titles and we create...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR LYNCH: ...agencies. Time is up? I'll press my light again.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Lynch, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR LYNCH: Well, I am not quite sure about the rest of you and I think we should try to cooperate with the agencies of the state, but you see one of the things I'm especially concerned is...with the fact that DAS is creating, with this new system, a personnel system now in place by the university, by the way, the use of two-cent cigarette tax that was supposed to come to LB 309 and won't now. And that two-cent sales...two-cent cigarette tax, which amounts to about \$1.5 million a year, will be used until they spend \$12 million of it, just to pay the interest on the new accounting system for DAS. Now, that might be necessary and they may need a new accounting system, but it's amazing the way people find ways to take money from one pot and stick it in another. In this case, the fund that we need and is far short of the necessary funds to meet our building
