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occur or will not be at all fruitful. So I'm hoping we can at least send the bill back to Government, ask them to graciously breath life back into the bill and let it sit there a little while to see if anything develops in the negotiations between the two counties. This boundary line is a pretty difficult thing in that area. The river switched its course. There's questions about jurisdiction for police protection, for road maintenance. And both counties had commissioned a rather expensive survey to redo the boundary line. The survey was done and then some Platte County folks had some second thoughts. And so that's why the motion is here. I would ask for your support to refer the bill back to committee. Thank you, Senator Crosby.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Robak, on the motion to refer.

SENATOR ROBAK: Thank you, Madam President and members of the body. I would object to this motion and I would object to that on the grounds that we do have time to introduce a new bill, next year, in committee. I think this sets a bad precedent right now. Platte County is probably negotiating this. At this time they do not have a vote out there, deadlock vote to do anything on this. We don't have a consensus in the Platte County, and we're still working on it. And I think we should probably wait until next year to take this issue up again, because Platte County has not decided, one way or the other. I guess, according to law, there's nothing we can do until both sides...both counties agree to this land. Is that correct, Senator Schimek?

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I don't believe so, Senator Robak. Senator Bromm might be better to ask that, but he just shook his head no also.

SENATOR ROBAK: Okay, my apology then, I regret that. I just ask the body to...not to consider this motion because I think it sets a bad precedent. The bill was killed in committee and that's where it should be. If Platte County does negotiate and decide to release this land to Butler County, then there's time enough to do it next year.
