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And after line 24 then, after "(2)" insert "The cost-share responsibility of the commission for division fences," division, not boundary, "shall not exceed the amount appropriated to the commission by the Legislature for such purpose during any biennium, except that the commission may use any funds specifically gifted or obtained by grant application to the commission, the sole purpose of which is to provide division fencing for a state recreational trail." That's just limiting language. What Senator Coordsen is doing now, I think, is before the fact, because Senator Coordsen's objection to the Schrock amendment actually is an objection to the bill...or to the...to the committee amendment. I think it would be better procedure, faster, more efficient, less fattening, whatever you want to say, to consider just the Schrock amendment rather than Senator Coordsen's opposition to it. We can get to Senator Coordsen's opposition after the Schrock amendment to the committee amendment is...is settled, because the Coordsen amendment discusses another part of the committee amendments. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Vrtiska, on the Schrock amendment.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. Senator Schrock, could I ask you a clarifying question, please?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Schrock?

SENATOR VRTISKA: As I...as I read the amendment that you put forth and as you explained it, if I'm correct, you said that the fences that would be built...only if the money was available. Is that sort of, in a short version, what you said?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That is correct.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, the question I have then is, if somebody has a problem on a division fence, and that's what we're talking about, correct, and they want to turn their cattle out, does that mean that, if they need to do it, that they're going to have to go ahead and do it on their own? Or I mean I'm...I'm trying to understand. If there's no money available, the fence won't be built. What...what's the alternative?
