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members of the Patrol. Is that right?

SENATOR SCHMITT: Right.

SENATOR VRTISKA: So that's something that you, I guess in your earlier statement, indicated it could happen again and you want to prevent it.

SENATOR SCHMITT: That's exactly what the bill is intended to do.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, that's the way I understood it and I just wanted to make that clear in my own mind and, given that situation, I'm prepared to support the Chambers amendment and support the bill as it moves ahead. With that, thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Schmitt.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yes, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, I guess I just wanted to remind you all. Last week I passed out that little cartoon that Leigh Rubin had put out there and says: "Don't be silly, ma'am, of course we don't have ticket quotas. Thank goodness, I've only got to say that six more times today." And I guess that is what I'm trying to say. And along with that, I may be wrong, I'm not an attorney, but if I was a defense attorney on a traffic citation, one of the first questions I would probably ask the officer is, do you have a quota? And if he answered "yes", the next question would be, have you filled it this month? And if he said "no", I think that would put a lot of doubt into a judge's mind. So I just wanted to throw that out there for thought. This isn't directed at any one person. It's just directed at what I hope will make better law enforcement for the state of Nebraska and the citizens of Nebraska, and I'm going to support Senator Chambers' amendment, hope that the body will too, and then we can go ahead and move LB 204. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Schmitt. Senator Cudaback, on the Chambers amendment.
