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SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, if I could educate myself a little bit with Senator Chambers, I would like to have an exchange with him.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield to a question, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Chambers, let me...let me say right off that I am in fact educating myself. But the general area of concern that I have is with respect to the broad area of procedures, court procedures, courtroom procedures, everything that applies to a particular action, and which may change whether...based upon whether it's a misdemeanor or a felony, and based upon whether it's an infraction or not an infraction. And I understand, I think, what you've said about the matter being a criminal offense. But I'm looking at Section 60-688 of the statutes, and I don't know if you have that in front of you. It's pretty short, and what it does, it says that prosecutions for violations declared by the Nebraska Rules of the Road to be misdemeanors or felonies shall be conducted and disposed of in the same manner as provided for such prosecutions under the laws of this state.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: What...what I'm looking for is either a parallel description that says that...how...how...how infractions will be dealt with and disposed of and...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Beutler, oh, excuse me, I thought...

SENATOR BEUTLER: No, and, well, perhaps that's enough to...to illicit a response from you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I didn't bring the citation of State v. Knoles, but that is precisely what the Nebraska Supreme Court discussed, used the entire case to discuss how infractions are to be processed.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.
