SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay, so there will not be any remaining structures then where the state is going to have to come in and spend a lot of money on repairing or restoring to the original state and so on? Everything, as you say, everything is going to be demolished and they'll go from there. They'll end up with just the property itself, the land and so on.

SENATOR SCHROCK: That is correct. The improvements, apparently, that are there are in poor condition and apparently have no value.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay, thank you very much. Thank you, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Further discussion on LR 295? Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, Senator Schrock, if I might, I know that in past times when we looked at some of these we always kind of checked, because there was an instance where it was involved about environmental cleanups and whether there were any problems with oil or gas spillage or any kind of cleanup that the state might be obligated to do by acquiring the land. Could you just comment on that briefly?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Schrock?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, I will. As...Game and Parks Commission staff found the property, after inspection, to be absent of any serious environmental hazards, Senator Beutler. That's about as far as I can comment on that. But there should be no problem with any environmental issues as far as cleanups of a waste or dump site or anything like that. It's not like we're talking...we're not talking about leaky underground storage tanks here or that type of thing.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, thank you, Senator. Thank you.
