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SENATOR JENSEN: Yes, thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. Senator Lynch, would you respond to a question, please?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Lynch, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR LYNCH: I'll sure try.

SENATOR JENSEN: This converts really a pickle card into a pickle machine, is that correct?

SENATOR LYNCH: That's about it, yeah, yes.

SENATOR JENSEN: And the purpose is to make that a quicker operation than the current scratch-off or tear-off type of approach that you have with a pickle card, is that correct?

SENATOR LYNCH: No, not really. I've seen some people that play a lot of pickle cards open up all five at the same time, faster than they can run their finger down the machine. It's not intended to make it faster, it's...

SENATOR JENSEN: And the amendment doesn't do anything with...as far as the machine portion, am I correct in that, that it's...

SENATOR LYNCH: Yeah, it's still a machine, except that with the dispensing machines that now exist, with the paper, they load this up with a game; in a paper-dispensing machine you put your money in and you take your card out. This simply says you put your...you put your money in and then the pickle card is displayed on the screen. You can take as much time as you want and play with it, punch one at a time and open it up, et cetera.

SENATOR JENSEN: Well thank you, Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: It's just technology, Senator Jensen, nothing else. It doesn't change anything, except allows the advance of technology to help us in Nebraska keep whatever charitable dollars we have here rather than continue to see it go across the river.

SENATOR JENSEN: Okay. Thank you, Senator Lynch. Members of
