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PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Yeah, I don't disagree with you. You know, the possibility exists that there will be machines replacing paper cards, I guess, I'm not quite sure. However, as I understand it, the positions they suggest that cost the A bill revenues would not be, and it says right here, if I could read this, please, based on the past experience with the agency, it is unlikely that these positions will be hired until the workload justifies it. Therefore the first year the A bill shows approximately one-half of the fiscal note cost estimated by the division, the second year the full amount. But we don't even know after the first half a year whether the activity is going to be enough that they can justify hiring more people. And I don't...I hope that's a reasonable enough answer because I really don't know either.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you.

SENATOR LYNCH: I just don't think we're going to need more. We don't have any more people that gamble, they're just going to, hopefully, instead of going across the river, keep their money here in Nebraska.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute. Thank you, Senator Redfield. Further debate on AM0445 to LB 659? Senator Aguilar.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the body. I rise for the sake of discussion on this matter, just to state that I don't really see this as expanded gambling. I see it as a way of taking what we have now and making it just that much more profitable for the charitable organizations that utilize this system. Thank you.
