Is this red? All right, the red sheet. Okay. What this red sheet contains is information from the facility master plan about the needs of the juvenile system; and lots of times when we pay for consultants sometimes they tell us what we already kind of knew and, clearly, before we started this process Senator Dwite Pedersen knew these issues were critical. The group, and Senator Suttle and I served from the Legislature on the Nebraska Planning for Juvenile Services, knew these were areas that we needed. We now have the data. We now know the numbers. We now know the projections and what it's going to cost. But what this study said was there's no current level five, remember, there are five levels. One to three could be in the community. Four is a YRTC or a treatment placement that's not secure. Level five is a secure locked facility available for OJS for placement of youth that require a higher level of security than a level four YRTC. The percentage of youth requiring a level five high security placement is small, but the inappropriate placement of these youth at the level four YRTCs causes operational difficulties and safety risks. The projected capacity for boys requiring a high security placement is 35 by the year 2005. It then goes on to say what it would need. It recommends it be in Omaha or Lincoln because that's where the majority of the youth who are at level five reside, and these youth are coming back to the community and it's important to connect them to their communities and community services once they leave in order for them to be successful. It requires a high security perimeter unlike the open campus environment of the YRTCs. The facility also could be collocated with a high security sex offender treatment facility, and the youth would be there about a year. Then the description of the sex offender treatment needs follows and it is a need for 30 male by the year 2005, and it can be collocated. We also could contract out for the sex offender treatment program if we wanted to use the space at this facility. Average length of stay would be 12 months, but you could...they could be staying up to a 18-month period. In 1999, December 1999 dollars, the cost of these two collocated housing areas was \$14 million, and a projection to when we could get from today to it being built is \$19 million. This is expensive housing. Behind that you have the...a little brochure on the secure correctional youth facility, which is now operated by the Department of Corrections in Omaha. This facility cost \$11 million to build. It opened a year and a half ago. It is
