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prison. Is that true?

SENATOR THOMPSON: Yes, that's true. Currently, there are 60...can get my notes but this is close, 68 beds. There are 10 that are what I call special management beds that are in use at that facility.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Thompson, and I realize that there's more you could say and will say as we continue with the discussion, but for today I want to make some general observations again. If you have a limited capacity for containing anything and you have a greater quantity that you need to contain than the capacity of the container, there's going to be some overflow. I want to know what constitutes the overflow so, in this case, we're talking about young people across the board. How will the selection be made, who will make it, and what becomes of that overflow...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...which cannot go into the container? We're talking about what I call the youth prison in Omaha, but it does not have adequate space to accommodate all of the young people who ought to be in a facility where they can receive treatment, so some are going to be sacrificed, apparently. If we don't think they ought to be going to the adult prison we're, nevertheless, going to accept or adopt a proposal that is going to assure that some go to the adult prison, and some who are in a less secure confinement will wind up in the youth prison. So the discussion that we have I think is going to have to be focused on these different categories of young people because I'm going to want to zero in on how they wind up being placed in that category. They are not born that way. They are placed in that category and it all has to do with prosecutors, judges...

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and the attitude of this society.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Thompson.

SENATOR THOMPSON: The issues that...Madam Speaker, members of
