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typically, in my opinion, will make bad law. You don't make a law to fix one problem that may not be a problem in the future. So, with that, I would urge opposition to this bill and I'll continue to oppose it as long as I can. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Bruning. Continued debate, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I'm not going to prolong the discussion, but, since my name is on the bill as the introducer, I need to say something in view of the opposition raised. I don't know if...I'd like to ask Senator Bruning a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Bruning, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR BRUNING: Yes, I'll yield.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Bruning, I don't recall, but were you here when this bill was discussed on General File?

SENATOR BRUNING: I was not, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you very much. I want to call something to Senator Bruning's attention. He thought, from what he said, that Don Stenberg is the impetus for this bill. Those who were here know that no Attorney General's name was mentioned. I pointed out that I brought this bill as early as 1972, before Senator Bruning probably was born and...or shortly after he was born, and I've brought it periodically down through the years, Senator Bruning, before Don Stenberg ever ran for office and this is the first time it was debated on the floor of the Legislature. I believe it has been advanced to the floor before, but we would always adjourn sine die and it would pass away, like the other bills did. The bill got in the high thirties, in terms of votes, the other day and I hope those who heard the discussion will stay with the bill, and I don't think it would be necessary to repeat all that discussion at this time. But I just wanted to put on the record for Senator Bruning's information, as I did for everybody else who was here when we discussed it at great length on General File, that no
