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would be familiar with that would...would describe as a legal fence, and that is in the original LB 701 and all of the amendments, which is a typical barbed wire pasture fence. This expands the use of that from both border fences, but it expands it to division fences where those fences where the trail divides property of the same owner. The amendment provides, and this was agreed by Game and Parks, that they shall construct the fences to the condition of this...to the...to the specifications as in statute as a maximum standard to (inaudible), and then the landowner will maintain the fence, with the Game and Parks Commission providing the supplies for maintenance. That is if the wires come loose, if posts need to be replaced, the landowner will provide the labor for doing that and the equipment; Game and Parks will provide the posts or the wire in the case that there's a prairie fire or something that does extensive damage to the fence. It leaves in place the provisions for posting the trail, which is one of the...one of the three-legs of our trespass statutes. It leaves in place the language declaring that whatever fence is agreed to shall be deemed to be manifestly designed to exclude intruders, which is another leg of the trespass statute. And it also provides, and I think this is an important thing to understand, it provides that the landowner and commission, by mutual agreement, can erect a fence to a lesser standard than the legal fence or, if there's an agreement, particularly in the case of cropland being on both sides or along the trail, no fence at all, if that's what the landlord says that they want. I think it's a good agreement that was worked out. It still maintains the problems...or still maintains the...the solution for the liability concerns of the adjoining landowners and it addressed the cost concerns that the Game and Parks Commission had in developing the trail. So, with that, I would...is Senator Schrock here? I would offer, if you wish, Senator Schrock, the rest of my time on the opening on the amendment. I think that, as I said, I would recommend that it be adopted. I think it's a good workable solution to what had been a thorny problem. Senator Schrock.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Coordsen. Senator Schrock, about five minutes.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the
