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Legislature, Senator Coordsen has adequately described the amendment. I would just tell you I think this makes the bill a better bill and it's probably more practical because, if the cows are out, the landowner is not going to call Game and Parks and have them put the cattle in and repair the fence. He's going to do it himself. But it does make Game and Parks responsible for the...for furnishing those repairs, and it treats all fences the same. Now, for those of you who come from urban areas, I thought a visual might be very beneficial this morning, so I brought up an example of a fence post and some barbed wire. So I would encourage you to make a stop by my desk back here and take a look at this, and so this is what's going to be used, well, not exactly what's going to be used on the Cowboy Trail, but if you use your imagination you can have a good example of what's going to be used on the Cowboy Trail. Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Schrock. Would you like to use your own time? Senator Crosby. Senator Crosby, on the Coordsen amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. President and members, and Senator Coordsen or Senator Schrock, either one, may answer this for me. I do have a question. When you talk about urban people, there are urban people who like trails and I have had some letters and calls that they don't like the Coordsen amendment. What have you done? You said the Farm Bureau, the Cattlemen, the whoever, who all? Will you answer that, Senator Coordsen?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: What?

SENATOR CROSBY: Were the recreational trails people, who worked very hard to promote, involved and did they buy off on it?

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Crosby. I would...have also received some of those. I would reference an e-mail message from an old acquaintance of mine that I haven't seen for a number of years, Dr. Max Klege (phonetic), who's a bicyclist, and he may have shared that with all of us. What they were
