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you might get a lot, you might get a little, you might get everything, or you might get nothing. Now there are some comments that I'm going to make with reference to judges this morning. As to how I will ultimately deal with this bill and the committee amendment, you'll just have to sit and wait. And the reason I know you'll sit and wait, because there are people who are interested in this bill. Usually, when I get up to talk, people start flying away like a covey of quail, and they go sit in their offices. Well, why don't you go sit in your offices on this bill, go sit there now. You all think that because there are occasions when you can manifest contempt that my memory is short and I won't reflect on that. But what I know, after having been in this Legislature so long, and I didn't have to be here nearly as long as some of you-all to catch onto things, the session goes beyond that one day when you had the upper hand. There are things that you want, and I've said it before and I'll say it again, there is nothing I want so badly out of this Legislature that I will change what I think I ought to do to keep you all from voting against something that I want. And you virtually destroyed my bill on felony murder, with more votes against that bill than the votes against my bills to abolish the death penalty, so that was a vote against me, to teach me something and put me in my place. It didn't put me in my place, and it didn't teach me anything. The only time you can be taught something is if new information comes to you that you don't know.

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But when it comes to this Legislature I can say, like Jesus said on one occasion, he had no need that anybody testify to him of man, for he knew what was in man. I know what this Legislature is about. And I know that you-all scoff and you laugh and you mock and you have fun with the lobbyists when you follow the orders of the lobbyists, and you, what you think of as being, put me in my place. But I know, as the song says, my day will come, and this may be it, but we'll have to see.
