SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let me ask a different question. Does the state Supreme Court in Nebraska take judicial notice of ordinances enacted by cities in this state?

SENATOR MATZKE: Well, I don't know that there's any answer to a general question like that. I think that's the reason for the...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's not general, that's specific.

SENATOR MATZKE: ...specific language in this statute is to specifically permit what would be county courts to take judicial notice of what the law is in Kansas or Colorado or Iowa, so that they would know. Now that becomes important because in Kansas you can be convicted of DUI with evidence of .08, and in Nebraska it has to be .10.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's not what I'm asking you.

SENATOR MATZKE: So, a conviction in Kansas would not be a prior conviction in Nebraska, because it's a different statute than ours is.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's not what I'm asking you. Does the Nebraska Supreme Court take judicial note...because you said, you know, you suggested that maybe I don't know what I'm saying or what I'm talking about, so I want to see if you know. Does the Nebraska Supreme Court take judicial notice of ordinances enacted by cities in the state of Nebraska? And, if you know...if you don't know, what reason would you have for knowing, if you haven't dealt in that area? I'm just asking, do you know?

SENATOR MATZKE: Well, that's...that's totally...that's totally up to the Supreme Court. If they wish to take judicial notice of statutes or ordinances, they have the power to do so.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What has the Supreme Court said on the issue? Will the Nebraska Supreme Court take judicial notice of the ordinances passed by cities in this state?
