them charged. In less than a month the Nebraska Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals said you can't do this. But those courts out there think they can. It's fortunate we have a different Supreme Court and some appellate courts. So when this kind of stuff that the county attorneys want, and they might get convictions in lower courts, when it goes upstairs, not only will the conviction, in my opinion, be overturned, but the law will be thrown out. And some lower court judge might see through this and throw it out. And that does not mean support for drunk driving, it means support for proper law making.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Dierks, to speak to the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR DIERKS: I want to speak to the bill, please.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Okay, thank you, Senator Dierks. Senator Matzke. Senator Matzke, did you wish to speak to the Chambers amendment? Senator Matzke waives. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I had intended to help work this bill and see if we could come up with something that would accomplish what I thought the purpose was. But now that I see it's apparently a county attorneys bill, and I don't have a lot of respect for them in general and their knowledge of the law and certainly the way they apply the law, on this one, because I think it is so poorly written and I think there are provisions that are unconstitutional, that I'm not going to waste a lot of time on it. If this were the kind of bill where I thought a lot of individuals would get enmeshed in that net and just throw up their hands and say, I got to suffer it because of one reason or another, I would fight it. But often times a big shot gets caught up in this kind of stuff, and a big shot is going to get a lawyer. And a big shot is going to get a good lawyer. And a big shot's good lawyer is going to say, well let me see, and then he'll tell his client, don't stand so close to me because that vile alcohol bothers me; how did you get here anyway. He said, (speaking like he is drunk) well, I just jumped in my car, drove on over. I know how to drive. And then he stops to think, he says, now am I putting a menace on the road? And then he says, everybody is entitled to a defense, and that's what I'm going to do, I'm going to
