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SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I'm not going to move for a reconsideration, I'm not going to ask for a call of the house, I'm not going to ask for a roll call vote, I'm not going to ask for a record vote. The ball is in you-all's court to play with it as you choose. And if you don't do anything with the bill, then I think you can probably get it moved by 10:45. That's all that I have to say at this point.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bruning, to speak to the Chambers amendment, please.

SENATOR BRUNING: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, after conferring with learned colleagues here, I'm going to agree with Senator Chambers' amendment to strike part (b). I understand his concern, that part two of it may or may not be workable, under Nebraska law, and I don't think it's really necessary to the overall intent of the bill. In the initial part of part (b) that he wants to strike, if we change the language there as we were discussing, it takes all the thunder out of it anyway, so I'm going to vote yes on the Chambers' amendment. But my concern is, and I hope the body is mindful of this, a lot of times this could be the slippery slope where Senator Chambers begins to take the entire bill out. I hope he doesn't do that because the concept of the bill I think is critical to Nebraska. There's a story that's been near and dear to folks in Sarpy County. I shouldn't say dear, but a lot of us are aware there's a guy name Shanahan, moved into Sarpy County. The reason he came to Nebraska was because they couldn't use his prior convictions against him here in the state. And that's one of the reasons for this bill. It's one of the reasons Senator Engel introduced this bill, one of the reasons a lot of us support it. I'm going to support the Chambers amendment, but as far as next steps go, I don't...I'm not going to be real inclined to want to amend it any further. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Bruning. To speak to the Chambers amendment, Senator Dwite Pedersen, Don Pederson, sorry about that. I needed to look at the end. I apologize.
