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Senator Kiel gave you it says 30 years, and that is...you need to make that correction that it is up to 35 years on the disability. In the green copy, that's page 7, line 3. There are also a couple other points that...I'd just like to ask Senator Kiel, so that she might explain a little bit on the qualified domestic relations orders statutes, could you explain why you've included that in this bill?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Will you yield to a question, Senator Kiel?

SENATOR KIEL: Yes.

SENATOR STUHR: It's the last bullet, the second from the bottom.

SENATOR KIEL: And what was your question?

SENATOR STUHR: And I'm asking...I am just asking so that the body might understand a little bit better why this particular issue was included in the bill.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR KIEL: The purpose of doing this is simply to qualify, or excuse me, to clarify what's on the books right now. And if a former spouse, who has obtained rights to future annuity benefits as a result of a qualified domestic relations order, in other words that's the settlement, they can request a lump sum payment in lieu of those future annuity payments, that the spouse will receive a percentage of the member's accumulated contributions. It's a clarification of the language, it's based upon a settlement and just to make sure that they can request a lump sum payment in lieu of monthly payments.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, because I think that does explain it a little bit in the fact that they don't, those spouses that might be separating, obtaining divorces, will not have to wait until their spouse would retire, but could receive a lump sum immediately.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.
