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the year 2000, you have a book of the kind that this article deals with that is to be published and sent abroad in the world, personally, I'm glad it's being done, to show the attitude that still exists toward women. But when you have that kind of thing still being published and broadcast throughout the land and perhaps the nation, through the Internet, it is necessary that there be an antidote, that there be a counter position, but it should not fall to one individual to do it. How in the world can some of us speak to groups including young women and tell them that we're aware of your problem, it's an unfair world and things ought to be done to make it right, but when all we have to do sometimes is speak and we will not speak? How can we expect any changes to occur? There is a basic fear in Americans, a fear of being out of step, a fear of not being accepted. So if men who are portrayed in all the mythological productions, whether it's comic books or movies on the screen portraying a mythical "Rocky"...I don't know when the last time was that a white man held a heavy weight championship of the world. They always portray these men as brave and courageous, but in the real world they are so afraid that they will not speak against wrongful conduct, mistreatment of those who are not in a position to take care of themselves. So it would seem that fear does reign throughout this society.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And FDR was right when he said we had...the only thing we have to fear is fear itself. But that fear takes on different guises and it manifests itself in different areas of activity. I believe, and it's my belief, I'm one person, that public officials, especially those who are elected, have a responsibility to help set a tone in society based on fairness and equity toward every member of that society. I have one more time to speak, and I'm going to take it.
